Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

At Manor Park we are committed to all children, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face. Our intention is that all pupils make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subjects. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers.

We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, rooted in robust diagnostic assessment, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils excel. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate under-developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disadvantaged pupils. These are evident from Nursery through to KS1 and in general, are more prevalent among our disadvantaged pupils than their peers.
2	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantaged pupils generally have greater difficulties with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers.
3	<p>Internal assessments indicate that reading, writing and maths attainment among disadvantaged pupils is significantly below that of non-disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>On entry to Nursery typically 100% of our disadvantaged pupils arrive below age-related expectations compared to 85% of other pupils (2022 to 2023 data). This gap remains steady to the end of KS1.</p>
4	Our assessments and observations indicate that many of our disadvantaged pupils have significant knowledge gaps leading to pupils falling further behind age-related expectations, especially in maths and reading.
5	<p>Our assessments, observations and discussions with pupils have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils, notably lack of confidence. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.</p> <p>22 pupils (13 of whom are Pupil Premium) currently require additional support with social and emotional needs, with all children receiving small group interventions.</p>
6	Our attendance data over the last 3 years indicates that attendance among disadvantaged pupils has been lower than that for non-disadvantaged pupils.

Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

To achieve and sustain improved wellbeing for all pupils in our school, particularly our disadvantaged pupils.	<p>Sustained high levels of wellbeing from 2023/24 demonstrated by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • qualitative data from student voice, student and parent surveys and teacher observations • a significant increase in participation in enrichment activities, particularly among disadvantaged pupils
To achieve and sustain improved attendance for all pupils, particularly our disadvantaged pupils.	<p>Sustained high attendance from 2023/24 demonstrated by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the overall absence rate for all pupils being no less than 95%, and the attendance gap between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged peers being reduced by 5%. • the percentage of all pupils who are persistently absent being below 4% and the figure among disadvantaged pupils being no less than 92%.

School ELSA	<p>We facilitate ELSA. ELSA is an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant. It is designed to build the capacity of schools to support the emotional needs of their pupils from within their own resources. This is achieved by training teaching assistants to develop and deliver individualised support programmes to meet the emotional needs of children in their care. Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

Embedding dialogic activities across the school curriculum.

Objective: Key focus on communication skills: including SALT strategies and oracy.

Outcome: This provision (in partnership with NELI and school bought Mable programme) has increased children's communication skills and oracy. Teachers have reported an improvement in clarity of pronunciation, vocabulary and confidence.

Embedding Little Wandle to secure stronger more effective phonics teaching for all.

Objective: Improved phonics and reading attainment amongst disadvantaged pupils.

Outcome: The introduction of Little Wandle has significantly improved phonics across the school. Assessment data has been used accurately to pin point sounds that children don't know and intervention have been tailored to address this. The structured approach to Little Wandle phonics has enabled the disadvantaged children to remember sounds, segment and blend words in their reading successfully.

Additional Phonic Sessions

Additional phonic sessions delivered by teaching assistants enabled 78% of all children to pass the phonics screening check. National average was 79%. 80% of PP children (4/5 children) passed the phonics screening check, whilst 78% of NON-PP children passed the check.

5 more children passed the phonics screening re-take in June 2023. Therefore, the overall percentage that passed in year 2 was 95%.

TA intervention for PP children and for vulnerable.

Objective: T.A's to deliver the following interventions:

- Catch up Little Wandle sessions
- Same day maths intervention
- Switch on to writing
- Reading three times a week with PP children
- TA support (1 to 1)
- TA support in small groups

Outcome: TA support contributed positively to the progress of PP pupils. In the Foundation Stage, TA support enabled PP pupils to make good and outstanding progress in the prime areas.

In year 1 Progress of PP children was outstanding in writing, whilst in reading and maths the progress was good. NON-PP children made the same progress as PP children in writing. In reading and maths NON-PP children made slightly more progress than PP children.

In year 2 the progress of PP children was good in reading, writing and maths. PP children made better progress than NON-PP children in reading, writing and maths.

Any poor progress amongst the PP children has been investigated and fed into the school improvement plan.

1 to 1 mentoring delivered by Brighter Futures through Sport.

Objective: PP children will receive a 30-minute mentoring session delivered through football. The sessions will enable every child to gain a feeling of self-respect, confidence, citizenship and social awareness through the medium of sport. This is a 1 to 1 provision focused on PP children.

Outcome: This provision has improved children's school work, behaviour for learning and self-esteem. Teachers have reported an improvement in children's confidence, behaviour, attitude and school work.

Attendance manager

Objective: Monitoring, reporting and responding to: Attendance of PP children, Persistent absentees and punctuality of PP group. PP children's attendance reviewed half termly and fed into pupil progress meetings and learning reviews days.

Outcome: Attendance data (2022/23) shows that absence for the PP group is less than the National Average. This is due to the rigorous monitoring and reporting by the attendance manager.

School – 92.8% (this includes persistent absentees)

School – 95.69% (persistent absentees removed)

Persistent absenteeism for the school PP cohort (7 children) was 18% compared to 25.5% nationally.

How many children were persistent absentees – 17 (7 were PP children). Some of the 7 PP children had medical issues in the 2022/23 academic year.
